FORMAT (GUIDE) FOR AN ENVIRONMENTAL REPORT

- a) Provide a complete project description including a description of all project-related activities such as land purchase, easements/right-of-way procurement, acreage/area, and proposed clearing, grading, excavation, paving, new construction, utility installations, fencing, etc. that will be involved with the project. Complete descriptions, locations, and maps must be provided for each site affected by the project-related activities. Maps must be equivalent to a Geological Survey 7.5-minute quadrangle map at a map scale of 1:24,000; USGS maps may be obtained and purchased at <http://www.usgs.gov/puprod/maps.html> all project elements must be clearly shown on any map provided.

- b) Land ownership, land use and current land use: The ER must describe the amount of property to be affected or disturbed by each project site(s) including the site's current land use and, if applicable, zoning. State if federal, state or private ownership and mention if there are formally classified lands (parks, wilderness areas, state or national forests, etc.)

- 1) For all proposals, except single family housing, the applicant must consider low income or minority populations that may be located within the vicinity of the proposal. Access EPA website for maps to include in the ER showing low income and minority populations in project area

- 2) For all proposals except for single family housing, non-construction proposals, and for those programs for which Intergovernmental Review is not required (B & I Guaranteed Program), the applicant is authorized to initiate consultation with State and local governments to afford them the opportunity to review program activities located in areas subject to their legal jurisdiction. See Clearinghouse list and submission form. (Attachments B and C)

- 3) Environmental Risk: A Phase I ESA is required for all commercial real estate direct or guaranteed loans equal to or greater than \$100,000 (e.g. any business, retail, community facility, housing or industrial site, not projects with General Obligation bonds) where a security interest is taken in the property. If applicable, a Phase I environmental site assessment conducted under the ASTM standard in the last six months is to be provided.

A TSQ (Transaction Screen Questionnaire) may only be used if the loan is less than \$100,000 and may only be completed under the approval of the RD Area office with consultation from the SEC.

- c) Historic Preservation: The ER must describe all steps taken to identify historic properties as required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. Any correspondence with State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO(s), Tribal Historic Preservation Officers (THPO's) or Tribes should be part of the ER.

Consultation with Native American Tribes or other potential consulting parties - Often regulatory agency contacts are initiated before funding sources are determined. Project sponsors are encouraged to initiate informal consultation with Native American Tribes in an effort to include them in determining the project's effect on any historic or cultural resources. Native American Indian Tribes must be consulted based on where aboriginal land area falls within the proposed project area. - d) Threatened and Endangered Species/Biological Resources: the applicant is to assist the Agency in making determinations of effect under S. 7 of the Endangered Species Act, and thus, the ER must document whether any project sites and activities will directly or indirectly affect any threatened, endangered, proposed or candidate species, or would adversely affect designated critical habitats. Needed is the U.S. Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service's (USFWS) determination that this project will have no effect on any endangered species or their habitats.

- e) Wetlands: The ER must document whether wetlands are present on or near project sites. If the presence of wetlands is suspected and they are potentially impacted, applicants may be asked to provide a wetland delineation to establish locations, proximity, and diagnostic environmental characteristics with respect to proposed project sites and obtain Section 404 of the Clean Water Act authorization through the issuance of a permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers or the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers:

Projects involving stream crossings, national waters or wetlands:

A response is needed from the Army Corps of Engineers stating whether or not this project will require any permits, impact any federal wetlands, and/or if a wetland delineation report is needed. State in the letter your opinion as to whether a Corps permit will likely be required for this project. Include supporting documentation, explaining your findings including a project location map, a preliminary project description or drawings if available, copies of the pertinent areas of the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) 7.5 minute x 7.5 minute topographic map, National Wetland Inventory (NWI) map and County Soil Survey maps WITH PROJECT AREA HI-LIGHTED. Please mention if hydric soils are present, as well as soils with potential hydric inclusions. Provide a brief narrative discussion and your preliminary jurisdictional determination. Give the Corps 30 days to reply stating that if no reply is received you will assume their concurrence.

- h) Important Farmland: The ER must document whether any project sites (except utility line construction) will convert agriculture lands defined as important farmland by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to non-agricultural uses. - Complete Information form/checklist and form AD 1006. Also a determination of the project area being within or without an Agricultural District should be included.

The Final Notice of Intent must be submitted to Ag. and Markets prior to advance of funds to construct the project. Preliminary Notices are no longer required.

- i) Environmental Risk Management: The ER must document the effect of hazardous materials substances or wastes that may be released at, generated by, or required for the operation of a proposed facility may have in the context of a real estate transaction, including presence of lead based paint, asbestos or mold. The applicant may be responsible for completing a TSQ or Phase I Environmental Site Assessment.
- j) Other resources: The ER must document whether any project sites are located within key water resource areas such as sole source aquifers or wellhead protection areas. The ER must also identify, as appropriate, if the proposal will affect coral reef ecosystems, or Adirondack Park lands. The State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) should also be completed as part of the Environmental Report.
