AK	Dan Sullivan, Lisa Murkowski	Don Young (At Large)	City of Atka	\$3,034,600		This Rural Development investment will finance a new 3,850 square foot community health clinic in Atka, Alaska, an extremely isolated community on the Aleutian chain. The current clinic is in disrepair and does not meet the needs of the community. This is the only clinic within a 350 mile radius. The new facility will provide primary and preventative care, integrated behavioral health, dental, optometry, telemedicine (primarily specialty, ER, behavioral and pharmacy), limited laboratory and radiology services, urgent/emergency care, wellness activities, community morgue service and itinerant lodging. The population of Atka is 75 people. Other funding sources include applicant contribution \$80,765; Aleutian Pribilof Islands Association \$28,279; Aleutian Pribilof Island Community Development \$48,675; local donations; \$57,760; and First Alaskans \$50,000.
AL	Richard Shelby, Doug Jones	Robert Aderholt (04)	Caddo-Midway Fire and Rescue District	\$100,000		This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a new fire truck to replace one of the trucks that is past its useful life. Caddo-Midway Fire and Rescue District serves the Caddo-Midway communities through two fire stations and six trucks. This rural community has a population of 3,677 and is located in Lawrence County.
AL	Richard Shelby, Doug Jones	Mo Brooks (05)	Life Resource Services of Jackson County	\$80,000		This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a building in Scottsboro to serve as a resource center for the homeless. The resource center provides shelter, laundry facilities and a multitude of services to help improve their quality of life. Services include: daily meals, clothing, assistance developing a resume and completing job applications, help finding permanent housing, transportation to drug court, referral to rehab facilities, and many other services. Life Resource Services of Jackson County has been operating since 2016 and is currently renting the building they plan to purchase. The facility is located in Scottsboro which has a population of approximately 15,000. The service area extends to Jackson County which has a population of 53,227. This is a much-needed project to help address the opioid epidemic in this area.

Gosar (04)	Steps To Recovery Homes	\$400,000	\$59,000	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a four-plex apartment building, and make improvements to the property. Each apartment has two bedrooms and will increase the housing capacity for the male clients, from nine to 16, who are enrolled in the Steps To Recovery Homes sober living program. This six month program provides a safe environment and services to individuals who are recovering from addiction, specifically opioid addiction. The program offers a place to live, a foundation of structure and accountability aligned with communication, provides life coaching, job skill coaching, jobs, and daily necessities such as clothes, furniture, transportation, toiletries, phone, internet, cable, etc. The improvements to be made to the property include roof replacement, painting each apartment, replace flooring, railing replacement on porches, build a secure fence around facility, heating and cooling system repairs, and purchase and add solar panels. No other organization provides this service in the service area of Cottonwood, Camp Verde, Sedona, and Rimrock, Yavapai County, Arizona.

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CA	Kamala Harris, Dianne Feinstein	Jared Huffman (02)	Redwood Community Services Inc.	\$2,998,500		This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase an 18,072 square foot building in Ukiah to consolidate three service locations for Redwood Community Services Inc. (RCS). RCS provides a variety of programs including foster care, behavioral health, family social services and more with multiple locations in Ukiah, Fort Bragg and Lake County. RCS currently uses three separate locations for administrative services, mental health and outpatient services, and foster/family adoption and placement services. Consolidating nearly all their vital services into one location will allow the organization to improve program delivery, as well as provide cost savings. Additionally, the new location will allow RCS to increase space for their Workforce and Innovation Opportunity Act program and Substance Use Disorder Treatment Center.
IN	Todd Young, Mike Braun	Larry Bucshon (08)	Valley Professional Community Health Center Inc.	\$764,000		This Rural Development investment will be used to provide additional financing to enlarge the Valley Professionals Community Health Center in Clinton, Ind. The project is located in a medically underserved area. The size of the existing clinic will be increased by 15,492 square feet which will enable the health center to provide more space for behavioral health group therapy and add 12 additional examination rooms that will support three additional primary care physicians. A full behavioral health care treatment team will be available to offer a full spectrum of behavioral health services to patients, including treatment for anxiety, depression and mood disorders. Providing patients with a holistic medical and behavioral care approach will enhance their overall health and well-being. An additional 8,500 patients will be served, resulting in 21,000 visits. Previous funding includes \$2,931,000 in Rural Development loans.
MI	Debbie Stabenow, Gary Peters	Fred Upton (06)	Village of Baroda	\$983,000		Rural Development funds will be used by the village of Baroda for improvements to their industrial park and also a streetscape project along First Street. This project will be constructed in concurrence with a funded water and sewer project. The proposed project includes building a roadway through the industrial park. The industrial park also requires sewer service. This is a developing area, especially between First Street and Hills Road in the village. There are 12 parcels located in the industrial park, 10 of which have already been sold. The main purpose of the streetscape project is to provide safe pedestrian accessibility and more street parking. The existing street does not have curb, gutter or sidewalk. New sidewalks, crosswalks, lighting and landscaping are all included in this project. The project will serve an area with 873 residents. The village is contributing \$75,000. Michigan Department of Transportation has awarded a \$95,000 grant towards this project.

Peterson (07)	Red Lake Band of Chippewa Indians	\$382,100		This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase equipment for the Red Lake Band of Chippewa Indians Road Department. The Road Department is responsible for maintaining the transportation infrastructure on the Red Lake Reservation. This project will help fund a new front-end loading truck and a combination gravel/snow plow and replace aging equipment that is beyond useful life. The reservation has a population of 5,896 living on 1,259 square miles in Northern Minnesota.

Smith (08)	Bloomfield Development Corporation	\$19,700	\$21,300	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a fully equipped police vehicle to be leased to the city of Bloomfield. This vehicle will replace an older vehicle which is no longer reliable or cost efficient. With the purchase of this vehicle, the city's police department will be better equipped to serve the 1,933 residents and allow for better police coverage in the community.
MT	Jon Tester, Steve Daines	Greg Gianforte (At Large)	Troy Rural Fire District	\$34,400		This Rural Development investment will be used to assist in improving an essential community service to a local, rural community. The Troy Rural Fire District located in northwest Montana was seeking a way to obtain funding to convert two military surplus 6 X 6 chassis trucks into water tankers for firefighting and suppression purposes. Troy Rural Fire District's two primary service areas are located in heavily forested areas and covered with two satellite stations with separate coverage areas. In addition to these coverage areas, the District provides coverage through mutual aid agreements. Each water tanker will provide 3,000 gallons of water to be available per station to respond to fire and suppression calls until other firefighters arrive on scene. The estimated in-service date for the converted vehicles will be the spring of 2019, and during the off season will be located in heated facilities and able to assist other local fire departments. Equipment for each converted tanker truck will consist of the tank, painting, radios and lighting. The converted equipment will improve the firefighter's response ability to improve public safety and overall effectiveness of the Troy Rural Fire District. This equipment will greatly enhance their ability to effectively respond and provide emergency services in the rural areas of northwest Montana and to the outlying areas of the city of Troy, Montana. This investment will benefit the 938 residents in Troy and the 1135 residents in outlying areas.
NC	Richard Burr, Thom Tillis	Walter B. Jones (03)	Town of Winfall	\$85,000		This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a multi-use fire/rescue vehicle for the fire department. The vehicle will provide transportation and be equipped with the necessary tools to assist in containing small fires and any other emergencies for the 594 rural residents in the town of Winfall.
NC	Richard Burr, Thom Tillis	Mark Walker (06)	Association for the Advancement of Education	\$12,427,000		This Rural Development investment will be used to construct a 48,404-square-foot building on a 9-acre site to expand the Hawbridge School near the town of Saxapahaw in Alamance County. The new building will house 315 students in grades 7 through 12. Students in grades 4 through 6 will continue to attend in the current facility, and the school will add classes in kindergarten through third grade, also in the existing facility. The expansion will nearly double the school's current enrollment to 600. The Association for the Advancement of Education, dba Hawbridge School, is a nonprofit corporation and state-chartered public school.
NJ	Robert Menendez, Cory Booker	Jeff Van Drew (02)	Cumberland County Improvement Authority	\$4,963,000		This Rural Development investment will be used to construct a 15,000-square foot new administration building for the Cumberland County Improvement Authority. The Authority is the only solid waste management facility in the county and is currently the only Authority in the State approved for direct discharge of leachate. Currently, the administrative, finance, and economic development staff work at multiple locations in the county. This new facility will consolidate the staff into one location which will result in better communications and efficiency of operations. This project will help better improve the services provided to the 320,246 residents the authority serves throughout Cumberland, Cape May and Salem counties.

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PR		Jennifer Gonzalez -Colon	Plenitud Iniciativas Ecoeducativas Inc.	\$25,100	\$50,000	This Rural Development investment will be used to acquire essential equipment (vehicles) to maintain the organization's educational curriculum which is focused on research, demonstrations and disseminations of sustainable practices in rural communities. This non-profit has conducted 20 week-long intensive service learning programs which have trained over 600 college students, as well as 50 long-term internships with local and international students. They have also collaborated with five local low-income schools with the creation of institutional vegetable gardens. They are currently working on a three year research and educational grant program with Bio-ponics in PR. They are experiencing an increase in demand to expand and enhance the hands-on demonstrations and workshops currently being offered, it is necessary to acquire two vehicles so that they can expand and sustain Plenitud's educational outreach projects throughout Puerto Rico. The vehicles purchased through this project will be used to transport material and personnel with minimum repairs and complications.
PR		Jennifer Gonzalez-Colon	Municipality of Barceloneta	\$564,450		The Rural Development investment will be used for the improvement and rehabilitation of an existing municipal government center building in Barceloneta. As part of the project, the following improvements will be done: roof repairs, interior and exterior painting, restrooms rehabilitation and electrical work, among other minor repairs. The existing building is a two floor structure with a capacity of 40,000 square feet. The essential facility includes three important state agencies: the Department of Family, the District Court and the Treasury Collection. Due to the infrastructure deterioration and the importance of the services provided, the restoration of this building is vital.
PR		Jennifer Gonzalez -Colon	Municipality of Arroyo	\$371,860		This Rural Development investment will be used to acquire solid waste disposal vehicles and equipment to provide quality services in the Arroyo Municipality. The equipment currently available is insufficient and too deteriorated to perform effectively. As a result, the rural communities are under served. The latest census indicates that Arroyo has 19,607 residents, of which 53 percent live below the poverty level. This project will enable Arroyo to provide adequate solid waste disposal services to these citizens.
PR		Jennifer Gonzalez-Colon	MAS Integrated School Masis	\$4,049,098		This Rural Development investment will be used to construct a bilingual school to provide the needed space required to expand its educational services. The school is currently operating at a full capacity of 400 students. This project will enable the institution to serve the increasing interest of parents seeking to enroll new students. The increased capacity will accommodate up to 650 children ages 3 to 17. This represents an additional 290 families in the rural area of Caracol Ward in Anasco, PR and the proximate areas. Sixty-three jobs will be created from this project.

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PR		Jennifer Gonzalez-Colon	Municipality of Barceloneta	\$403,785		The Rural Development investment will be used for the improvement and rehabilitation of an existing municipal theater in Barceloneta. As part of the project, the following improvements will be done: new air conditioning system, acoustic tiles, interior painting, smoke detectors, sanitary rooms rehabilitation, plumbing and upgrading, among other minor repairs. The renovated facility will provide essential educational, social and cultural services to approximately 7,000 families from the rural communities of Barceloneta. This project is expected to produce a positive economic impact to the municipality as well as to the surrounding commercial establishments.
SD	John Thune, Mike Rounds	Dusty Johnson (At Large)	Town of Davis	\$14,500	\$2,500	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a pay loader. This equipment will be used for maintenance, repairs, and other projects to benefit the 85 residents of this small town.
TX	Ted Cruz, John Cornyn	Randy Weber (14)	Sweeny Hospital District	\$36,000,000		This Rural Development investment will be used to construct a replacement health care campus for Sweeny Community Hospital that aligns with its outpatient and inpatient services and meets the hospital district's needs now and into the future. The facility will be integrated into a 29-acre campus providing care through a 24-hour Emergency Department with a Level IV Trauma designation and serve 20-bed medical/surgical patient units. The Sweeny Hospital District is located in Sweeny, Texas.
