Nushagak Electric and Telephone Cooperative (NETC) is headquartered in Dillingham. It provides electric, internet and cable TV services to several small Alaskan communities. NETC is isolated from other communities and has developed into a fully integrated electric utility that owns and operates its own generation to meet all power requirements. NETC serves 1,473 residential and commercial consumers using 95 miles of line. The economy is centered on fishing. Nearly one-half of the world's sockeye salmon is caught in the Bristol Bay region over a season lasting less than two full months. This circumstance requires NETC has sufficient capacity and reliability to maintain a pronounced summer load.
