# Home Repair Disaster Relief Grant Pre-Qualification Package

We are sorry for your hardships caused by the recent natural disaster in Vermont. The Disaster Relief Grant program is available for very-low-income households to assist in funding necessary repairs and improvements cause by the July 2023 flood. Included in this packet is information other Disaster Resources that applicants are encouraged to contact, as well as information about our Disaster Relief program.

To be considered for funding, applicant(s) must show evidence of funding decisions from FEMA and your homeowner's insurance company.

RESOURCES AVAILABLE FOR HOMEOWNERS IMPACTED BY JULY 10th VERMONT FLOOD

With the Presidential Disaster Declaration related to the flood on July 10<sup>th</sup> now in place, eligible homeowners in the affected counties will have some options for financial assistance available to apply to now.

If you are a **current Single Family Housing Direct Loan** borrower in these counties (502 program):

- You may be eligible to have late fees waived for 6 months
- You may be eligible to have a payment assistance agreement extended for 6 months
- You may apply for a payment moratorium for 6 months.

You may fax, mail or hand deliver this package to the Rural Development Office listed below. If deemed eligible, a Single-Family Housing Specialist will reach out to you with your next steps.

#### **Disaster Relief Single Family Repair Grants**

#### **Purpose of the Program:**

• To provide direct grant funds to very-low-income applicants to repair the damages to their dwellings caused by the natural disaster.

## **Eligibility Requirements:**

- Must own the dwelling to be repaired, maintain a life estate or long-term leasehold.
- Must be a US Citizen or permanent resident.
- Must be able to personally occupy the dwelling once the repairs are completed.
- Home is in a disaster area identified in the Presidential Disaster Declaration.
- Obtain the State Preliminary Damage Assessment from FEMA.
- Proof of ownership, rental, or other arrangement for principal residence documentation in the designated disaster area.
- Applicant's insurance information claim is needed for insurance benefits and evidence to show that the damage to the property is not fully covered.
- Applicant must provide documentation regarding destruction of or damage to the residence. This may include an insurance report, an inspection report by an independent fee inspector or government agency, or conclusive photographic evidence showing the destruction or damage.
- Must have total household income that does not exceed the Rural Development verylow-income limits.
- Must lack personal resources (e.g., cash, securities, real estate other than home and home-site) that can be used to meet repair needs.

#### **Eligible Grant Purposes:**

Grant funds may be used to pay costs of repairs or improvements which are identified health or safety hazards caused by the natural disaster.

## **Housing Requirements:**

- Homes must be brought into good repair with loan/grant funds.
- Homes must be located in a rural area and in one of the eight counties (see income limits worksheet enclosed for ineligible areas.) Not all deficiencies need to be corrected to be eligible.

#### Repairs to mobile homes can only be approved when:

- 1. The applicant owns the site or the mobile home is located in a mobile home park. The home is, or will be, placed on a permanent foundation.
- 2. Health and safety hazards are removed.
- 3. Properties must generally have access (either direct or via private right of way) to a town- owned or maintained road.

# **Ineligible Purposes:**

- Cannot repair income-producing property.
- Cannot finance the purchase of a dwelling.
- Dwelling should not be in a flood hazard area.
- Cannot finance cosmetic improvements, appliances, furniture or other personal property.

#### **Maximum Disaster Grant Amount:**

Maximum grant assistance to any one household for one dwelling is \$40,675.

# **Maximum Adjusted Income Limits:**

On the following pages are Household Income Limits for New Hampshire and Vermont. If your current income exceeds these limits or your household size is larger than 8 people, ask Rural Development about adjustments to income: ex. dependent children, childcare expenses, disabled, handicapped and elderly applicants or co-applicants.

#### NOTICE TO APPLICANT REGARDING PRIVACY ACT INFORMATION

The information requested on this form is authorized to be collected by the Rural Housing Service (RHS), Rural Business-Cooperative Services (RBS), Rural Utilities Service (RUS) or the Farm Service Agency (FSA) ("the agency") by title V of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended (42 U.S.C. 1471 et seq.) or by the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act (7 U.S.C. 1921 et seq.), or by other laws administered by RHS, RBS, RUS or FSA.

Disclosure of information requested is voluntary. However, failure to disclose certain items of information requested, including your Social Security Number or Federal Identification Number, may result in a delay in the processing of an application or its rejection. Information provided may be used outside of the agency for the following purposes:

- 1. When a record on its face, or in conjunction with other records, indicates a violation or potential violation of law, whether civil, criminal or regulatory in nature, and whether arising by general statute or particular program statute, or by regulation, rule, or order issued pursuant thereto, disclosure may be made to the appropriate agency, whether Federal, foreign, State, local, or tribal, or other public authority responsible for enforcing, investigating or prosecuting such violation or charged with enforcing or implementing the statute, or rule, regulation, or order issued pursuant thereto, if the information disclosed is relevant to any enforcement, regulatory, investigative, or prosecutive responsibility of the receiving entity.
- 2. A record from this system of records may be disclosed to a Member of Congress or to a Congressional staff member in response to an inquiry of the Congressional office made at the written request of the constituent about whom the record is maintained.
- 3. Rural Development will provide information from this system to the U.S. Department of the Treasury and to other Federal agencies maintaining debt servicing centers, in connection with overdue debts, in order to participate in the Treasury Offset Program as required by the Debt Collection Improvement Act, Pub. Referral of legally enforceable debts to the Department of the Treasury, Internal Revenue Service (IRS), to be offset against any tax refund that may become due the debtor for the tax year in which the referral is made, in accordance with the IRS regulations at 26 C.F.R. 301.6402-6T, Offset of Past Due Legally Enforceable Debt Against Overpayment, and under the authority contained in 31 U.S.C. 3720A.
- 9. Referral of information regarding indebtedness to the Defense Manpower Data Center, Department of Defense, and the United States Postal Service for the purpose of conducting computer matching programs to identify and locate individuals receiving Federal salary or benefit payments and who are delinquent in their repayment of debts owed to the U.S. Government under certain programs administered by Rural Development in order to collect debts under the provisions of the Debt Collection Act of 1982 (5 U.S.C. 5514) by voluntary repayment, administrative or salary offset procedures, or by collection agencies.
- 10. Referral of names, home addresses, and financial information to lending institutions when Rural Development determines the individual may be financially capable of qualifying for credit with or without a guarantee.
- 11. Disclosure of names, home addresses, social security numbers, and financial information to lending institutions that have a lien against the same property as Rural Development for the purpose of the collection of the debt. These loans can be under the direct and guaranteed loan programs.
- 12. Referral to private attorneys under contract with either Rural Development or with the Department of Justice for the purpose of foreclosure and possession actions and collection of past due accounts in connection with Rural Development.
