

From the Office of the State Director



Sarah Waring RD State Director – VT/NH

It has been a privilege to serve as RD State Director for Vermont and New Hampshire since 2022. In that time, I've received a fascinating and revealing education on the history and organization of federal funding and the power of its various impacts. Most often, federal agencies move money to state agencies for local distribution, but USDA is fundamentally different: we have the job of placing federal tax dollars directly into rural communities. This means we're a partner, often for decades, in the transformation of our hometowns.

During the Great Depression, 44% of the U.S. population lived in rural areas and 25% of them were farmers. New federal policies emerged which focused on rural American housing, clean water, infrastructure, power and, most importantly, accessible, affordable food. Rural people and their challenges were a priority for the entire nation.

Fast-forward 60 years to the early 90s, and the Depression-era rural programs managed by a handful of USDA agencies were inefficiently scattered over the federal funding landscape. The Clinton Administration conceived of a unified mission area to modernize and improve the government's role in rural America—involving comprehensive community and economic development work—and USDA Rural Development was born. For homeowners, farmers, businesspeople and town governments, it was an introduction to the agency that would stand by them, and champion their priorities, for generations to come.

Today, RD is a centralized agency acting as a lender, grantor and partner in projects that improve the quality of life for rural residents. Over the last five years, we've invested more than \$1.38 billion in the Twin States. That translates to roughly 3,450 families with safe housing, 550 businesses with lower costs, and more than 200 community institutions built or modernized, from town halls and libraries to high schools and hospitals. Though our work is incremental and sometimes slow, the USDA has a proud tradition of putting community-driven economic development first. Today is no different, and RD will be there every day, in good times and in bad, to invest in our rural neighbors and their future. --SW





Winter in New Hampshire was full of energy for Rural Development, as Aligned Solar Capital used a \$15.2 million USDA Electric Infrastructure Loan to build five large solar arrays in Maine and the Granite State.

Congressman Chris Pappas met with RD State Director Waring (right) at the Conway array (backdrop) to learn more about the project's 10.3 megawatts of annual generation—enough to power 1800 rural households.

Effingham was next, where (from bottom right to left) Rep. Pappas engaged leaders like Selectman Mike Cahalane to discuss the impact of a \$250,000 RD CF Disaster grant to rebuild the Snow Road Bridge with U.S. timber and steel—the only public access to the town transfer station. Along for the tour was Sam Evans-Brown, Executive Director of Clean Energy New Hampshire.

March of '23 saw USDA Deputy Secretary then Under Secretary for RD—Xochitl Torres Small (*backdrop*; *top*) visit St. Johnsbury, VT, to highlight \$28.4 million in healthcare funding.

Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital received a \$1 million USDA Emergency Rural Health Care grant and \$16.5 million Community Facilities loan to expand and modernize multiple departments, while Copley Hospital used a \$1 million ERHC grant and \$9.9 million CF loan to build an orthopedic clinic in Waterbury (see October).

Media covered the roundtable featuring Senator Peter Welch and state healthcare leaders, but it was a closed broadband session at the Fairbanks Museum afterward. Communication Union District directors from across the state gathered for a productive talk, including (bottom, from left) Christa Shute of Northeast Kingdom Community Broadband and Jenille Smith with CVFiber.

In May, Shute would successfully apply for a \$17.4 million USDA ReConnect grant, bringing reliable broadband to thousands of NEK residents. In October, CVFiber, which secured a \$25,000 USDA Rural Business Development Grant in 2019 for a feasibility study, would cut the ribbon on new service for central Vermonters.

Disaster struck the Green Mountain State in July 23, when excessive rain caused rivers to overflow their banks and flood surrounding rural communities.

Homes and businesses in Montpelier, situated on the Winooski River, were hit hard. As a stunned mother and daughter looked on, the Capitol building lawn along State Street became a pond in mere minutes (backdrop). A couple stood at the water's edge at Court and Elm Streets as a water rescue team navigated a channel that had been a roadway intersection just hours before (top right).

Residences on low-lying Main Street near the Stevens Branch in Barre were also devastated (top left). While salvaging what he could from his home, a flood victim at the nearby Berlin Mobile Home Park paused to consider a symbol of hope: a glowing tealight that survived the deluge (bottom left).

In the aftermath, USDA staff jumped to action in disaster recovery centers, helping some victims find shelter and others make home repairs through RD's expanded Single Family Housing Home Repair Grant program.


