Timber Production Expansion Guaranteed Loan Program

What does this program do?

The Timber Production Expansion Guaranteed Loan Program (TPEP) provides financial support to qualified lenders whose loan applicants want to establish, reopen, expand, or improve a sawmill or other wood processing facility that process ecosystem restoration byproducts from USDA Forest Service National Forest System lands.



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Who can apply?

Eligible individuals, organizations, or businesses engaged – or proposing to engage – in establishing, reopening, retrofitting, expanding, or improving sawmills or other wood processing facilities What is an eligible area?

What types of lenders are eligible to use the loan guarantee?

To participate in this program, lenders must first be approved by USDA Rural Development using criteria from the OneRD Guaranteed Loan Initiative (information available at this link: go.usa.gov/xe8QV). Examples of approved lenders include:

- Federal and state-chartered banks
- Savings and loan associations
- Farm Credit Banks with direct lending authority
- Credit Unions

Community development loan funds and other nonregulated lending institutions approved under the OneRD regulation also can participate. You will find a video explaining the approval process for nonregulated lending institutions at this link: tinyurl.com/RD-lenders.

Are there geographic eligibility restrictions?

Applicants must use ecosystem restoration byproducts from federal or Tribal lands considered high or veryhigh priority for ecological restoration involving vegetation removal. They also must source a significant amount of raw material from federal or Tribal lands.

High- and very-high prioritydesignated lands can be found using the TPEP Priority Areas dashboard at this link: tinyurl.com/TPEP-lands. A collaboration between USDA Forest Service and USDA Rural Development, the dashboard is meant to help financial institutions assess loan applications based on alreadyidentified ecological restoration work needs.

The identified areas focus on three priorities:

- Forest stocking levels (which measure the relative density of a stand of trees and determine how well the stand is using available growth space)
- Wildfire hazard potential
- Percentage of treed areas at risk for insects and diseases

The dashboard is searchable by state, county, and address. For additional information, see the "About the Data" section in the left column of the dashboard.

How can guaranteed loan funds be used?

Examples of fund use by sawmills and wood processing facilities include:

• Establishing, reopening, expanding, or improving a sawmill or other wood processing facility that uses

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ecosystem restoration byproducts from USDA Forest Service National Forest System lands

- Identifying and building markets for biomass and small-diameter materials removed during ecosystem restoration
- Implementing projects that:
 - Support wood product innovation, biochar (a black carbon bioproduct of biomass such as wood chips, or agricultural waste products like manure), and other options for transporting and using the material
 - Mitigate the risk of wildfires, insects, and diseases in our nation's forests
 - Rebuild the timber industry, provide good jobs in rural areas across the country, and support the emerging mass timber industry What are some of the grant terms?

How can guaranteed loan funds NOT be used?

Guaranteed loan funds can not be used for

- Lines of credit
- Ag production including timber production
- Payment or distribution to a beneficiary of a borrower, or to an individual, organization, or business that retains an ownership interest in the borrower

How do we get started?

Interested borrowers can work with their own lenders

We will accept applications from lenders until funds are spent
