Washington Terrace Volunteer Fire Department Receives Fire Engine - Within Weeks of Their Old Fire Engine Failure

WASHINGTON TERRACE, UT — As Mayor Mark Allen spoke, his energy continued to ramp up. It's likely he was excited to play with the fire equipment at the ribbon cutting event in honor of the new fire engine. On Tuesday, November 5th, Washington Terrace City Hall hosted a ribbon cutting like no other – for a community that couldn't be more appreciative.

Washington Terrace had received <u>USDA Rural Development Community Facilities</u> grant funds from a congressionally directed spending allocation of \$468,000. Congressman Blake Moore and other leaders had given Washington Terrace the support they needed to obtain the funds.

Through the hard work and persistence of City Manager, Tom Hanson, the funding was included in the 2024 budget – and they knew they needed to act fast. The current fire truck used by the town was nearly 30 years old, and limping by, at best. "The lack of dependability [in the current fire engine] put us all at risk, while responding to an emergency." This was an unnecessary risk, not usually found in firefighting.

Washington Terrace City maintains the Volunteer fire department; their service area includes 2 miles, and 9,200

residents. The volunteer station houses a 3-person crew for 24 hours, 7 days a week. It's a lot to ask community members to contribute their time, but to multiply the risk with unreliable equipment is too much. The grant

funds combined with an applicant contribution to pay the balance, empowered them to provide a reliable fire engine – and they needed it as soon as possible.

Molly Najarro is the USDA Community Facilities Specialist assisting Washington Terrace in the eligibility and closing for the fire engine. As Tom scrambled through the paperwork, Molly was expediting the process in record time. Tom explained, "Molly was absolutely instrumental in helping us through the process." He laughed about the many times he would call Molly to find what form was needed next. Sometimes it was a signature and certification, other times it was financial documents and audits.

As they sped through the necessary forms, the inevitable happened; their current fire engine broke down. They had bought the engine years ago, and it was used when they received it. "I remember the city manager calling almost daily to see where we were in the process," Molly noted; "I'm so grateful they didn't tell me then that their old truck broke down!" At that time, the fire department was responding to all calls in a 20-year-old ladder truck that was approximately 50 feet long, which delayed their response time navigating through narrow streets.

As luck would have it, Washington Terrace was approved for obligation and was able to obtain a floor-model engine that expedited the delivery by 2 to 4 years! Tom said the team effort between USDA RD, the city employees, mayor, auditor, and countless others is the only way it could have all come together.
