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USDA Funds More than \$950K in Technical Assistance Grants to Support Rural Energy for America Program Applicants

Expertise Available to Help VT/NH Farmers, Producers, Small Businesses Benefit from \$1.05 Billion in '23-'24 Inflation Reduction Act REAP Funding

MONTPELIER, Vt., Jan. 25, 2024 – U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development State Director for Vermont and New Hampshire, Sarah Waring, today announced \$951,197 in Technical Assistance Grants (TAGs) to help rural small businesses and agricultural producers apply for funding through the Rural Energy for America Program (REAP). As directed by the Biden-Harris Administration, REAP, which increases energy efficiency and decreases costs for thousands of rural U.S. businesses each year, received \$1.05 billion through the end of fiscal year 2024 under the bipartisan Inflation Reduction Act, and doubled its maximum project funding levels. On Monday, the Agency announced more than \$5.1 million in REAP grant funding throughout the Twin States.

"Farmers, producers and small business owners don't have the luxury of a 'work/life balance' because their work *is* their lives," said Waring. "The time it takes to fully understand and navigate a REAP application is significant—it can involve feasibility studies, environmental reviews, and other technical reports—not to mention the grant-writing itself. With REAP TAG funding now available, technical assistance providers throughout Vermont and New Hampshire can help these forward-thinking businesses grow, save money and hire more people while doing their part to fight climate change."

REAP TAGs can be used to help small businesses conduct audits and assessments, prepare reports, plan construction, and file and register for applications, among other uses. Eligible REAP TAG applicants include for-profit and non-profit entities, public utilities, investor-owned utilities, colleges and universities, local governments, electric cooperatives and councils.

In Vermont, three technical assistance (TA) providers will support different applicant groups:

- Farm Credit East \$200,000 REAP TAG. Works with agricultural producers to prepare financials, file reports and write grant applications.
- **Pecos Wind Energy** \$152,050. Identifies small businesses and farmers situated in ideal locations for wind power generation.
- Ecology Action \$100,027. Supports small and independent grocers to upgrade heating, cooling and refrigeration systems.

In New Hampshire, two TA providers will form a multi-service partnership:

• Clean Energy New Hampshire – \$499,120. Works with Plymouth Area Energy Initiative to help eligible small business and agricultural producers create comprehensive REAP applications.

"Partnering with Vermont agribusinesses to provide grant writing support will reduce the cost and how-to barriers that many busy farmers face," said **Heather LaPierre**, Grant Coordinator for Farm Credit East. "Our goal is to make the process simple and help farmers prioritize the energy efficiency improvements and renewable energy projects that are right for their business."
