## Rural Placemaking Innovation Challenge

# What does this initiative do?

The Rural Placemaking Innovation Challenge (RPIC) provides planning support, technical assistance, and training to encourage placemaking activities in rural communities. Funds can be used to help build capacity for broadband access, preserve cultural and historic structures, and support the development of transportation, housing, and recreational spaces.

Applicants must demonstrate experience in administering state or federal grants, and providing economic development and placemaking technical assistance in one of four U.S. regions: northeastern, southern, Midwestern, or western.

#### What is "placemaking?"

Placemaking is a collaborative engagement process that helps leaders from rural communities create quality places where people want to live, work, learn, and play.

Working with partners in the public, private, Tribal, philanthropic, and technology sectors, placemaking uses a wrap-around approach to community and economic development that blends creativity and infrastructure initiatives to build and promote vibrant public spaces.

#### What kind of funding is available?

Up to \$4 million in RPIC funding is available. The maximum grant award is \$250,000.

#### How can funds be used?

Grant recipients can use funds to provide technical assistance and training to help rural communities identify and gather partners, establish community needs, and develop placemaking plans. We particularly encourage applications that support planning projects to improve capacity for broadband infrastructure, deployment and access.

#### What is an eligible area?

Planning must directly benefit cities or towns with populations of 50,000 or fewer.

#### What key factors must plans include?

Your plan must demonstrate your ability to support rural planning activities on a multijurisdictional or multisectoral basis, and it must:

- Emphasize partnerships and collaboration among public, private, philanthropic, and community partners
- Combine federal, state, local, and Tribal (as appropriate) resources to make wide-ranging impacts on rural quality of life
- 3. Use placemaking processes to create quality places where people want to live, work, learn, and play

#### How to apply:

You must use <u>grants.gov</u> to apply. You will find the RPIC application by entering Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CDFA) number 10.890 in the CDFA drop-down under "Basic Search Criteria," located at the top left of the Search Grants webpage, available at https://go.usa.gov/xJf9j.
