### **Federal Cooperative Development Assistance**

## U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)

**USDA** provides funding and program support for cooperatives through several of its <u>agencies</u>. The following agencies administer several programs that benefit cooperatives and their members:

<u>Rural Development</u> maintains the following programs and services that may assist cooperatives and their members:

- <u>Cooperative Services</u> provides technical assistance and cooperative educational materials
- The Rural Cooperative Development Grant is a competitive award to cooperative development centers that help individuals and businesses start, expand, or improve rural cooperatives and other mutually owned businesses
- The Socially Disadvantaged Groups Grant competitive program provides funds so cooperative development centers and cooperatives can assist socially disadvantaged groups to create cooperatives
- Cooperatives can receive guaranteed loans through the <u>Business and Industry Loan</u> <u>Guarantee Program</u>. These loans can be used, for example, to convert a business

- to an employee-owned worker cooperative; enlarge, repair, or modernize a business; or purchase and develop land
- The <u>Value-Added Producer Grant</u> provides funds that cooperatives can use for planning or putting in place operations improvements that add value to an agricultural crop

# The Intermediary Relending Program provides 1 percent low-interest loans to local lenders including cooperatives ("intermediaries") that re-lend to businesses to improve economic conditions and create jobs in rural communities

- Rural Business Development Grants can provide small businesses with technical assistance and training, or business loans to fund a business incubator
- Rural Energy for America Program (REAP)
  provides guaranteed loans and grants
  to agricultural producers and rural small
  businesses for renewable energy
  systems or to make energy efficiency
  improvements
- Multi-Family Housing <u>Direct</u> and <u>Guaranteed</u> Loans. While the direct loan has been unfunded in recent years, the guaranteed loan program is available to provide guaranteed financing for low- to moderate-income occupants.
- Among other programs cooperatives can take advantage of include <u>broadband</u> grant and loan programs and <u>water and waste</u> loans, grants, and loan guarantees. Browse more <u>here</u>.

The <u>Agricultural Marketing Service</u> administers a number of programs to assist cooperatives and other agricultural producers with marketing foods to consumers across the country and



internationally. AMS also <u>purchases</u> food from agricultural producers for distribution through the USDA Food and Nutrition Service programs for schools, food banks and households as part of the nation's food safety net.

The Farmers Market Promotion
 Program increases the availability of locally and regionally produced agricultural products by providing outreach, training, and technical assistance to domestic farmers markets, community-supported agriculture programs, and other direct producer-to-consumer market opportunities.
 Related programs include the Regional Food System Partnerships program and the Local Food Promotion Program

Additional AMS programs may support cooperatives and their members in the dairy, maple syrup, meat and poultry, seafood, and sheep husbandry industries

The Food and Nutrition Service administers a variety of programs that purchase food for low-income individuals from agricultural producers and works with states and territories that authorize groceries, farmers markets, and Community Supported Agriculture programs to accept food vouchers from low-income individuals. Cooperatives and cooperative members may become vendors through the following FNS programs:

The <u>Farm Service Agency</u> offers a number of programs that may help cooperatives and their members including:

Farm loan programs

Conservation reserve <u>programs</u> that pay farmers to take their land out of production

A Biomass Crop Assistance Program for forest owners that produce biomass feedstock

A Feedstock Flexibility <u>Program</u> to encourage the domestic production of biofuels from surplus sugar

Programs that benefit <u>cotton</u> and <u>dairy</u> farmers

Disaster assistance programs

Commodity <u>loans</u> providing interim financing at harvest time to meet cash flow needs

Facility loan <u>programs</u> that help producers build or upgrade farm storage and handling facilities

<u>Assistance</u> to producers with commodities impacted by retaliatory tariffs

An Organic Certification Cost Share Program that provides cost share assistance to agricultural producers who are obtaining or renewing their certification under the National Organic Program
