Managing the Surplus of Summer

Tamworth, New Hampshire, has a population of roughly 3,000 full-time residents. Located between the Granite State's Lakes Region and White Mountains, the area teams with recreation-friendly opportunity and is a popular destination for weekend tourists, extended vacations and seasonal work. The community receives a regular boost to its economy when the summer population swells to roughly 5,000, but the Tamworth transfer station had a hard time keeping up with the extra waste.

Innovative Tradition Takes on Modern Challenge

The people of Tamworth have an inventive, practical approach to community development rooted in a rich rural history. The town boasts one of the oldest repertory theaters in the U.S., a 200-year-old working farm and museum, and locally provided health care. But the coronavirus, along with several storms and floods, had a devastating economic impact. Built in 2000, the transfer station's age and limited capacity meant municipal leaders had to put their imaginations to work once again.

A Win-Win with Efficient Waste Management

A group of concerned citizens formed the Tamworth Recycling Project in 2018, which led to a town committee and contact with USDA Rural Development. RD approved a Community Facilities Disaster Relief grant application to modernize the station. A new storage and loading area, truck scale, baler and forklift will vastly improve source-separated recycling and sorting capability. The town's recycled items will be sold back to the community, benefitting both the economy and environment.
