Lewis & Clark Behavioral Health Services	This Rural Development investment will be used to provide additional funding for the construction of the new Lewis and Clark Behavioral Health Services (LCBHS) facility. LCBHS was established in 1977 to provide behavioral health and substance abuse services, and has been operating out of several buildings located at different sites throughout Yankton, South Dakota. The new facility will house all services in a 59,616 square foot building and provide safe, private and high level of care.	\$677,000
Edgemont Senior Citizen Club	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase kitchen appliances by the Edgemont Senior Citizen Club. The appliances will allow them to keep up with the demand for affordable or free healthy meals for senior and disabled citizens in Edgemont. They have meals available at their center or delivery to shut ins. The volunteers not only provide meals but check in on people to make sure they are safe and all right.	\$48,000
Mobridge Regional Hospital	This Rural Development investment will be used to replace, update and improve technology used to treat, diagnose and mitigate the spread of COVID. Funds will be used to purchase numerous items including an ambulance, CT scanner, digital x-ray machine, and to staff monthly vaccine and booster clinics for the next three years. Mobridge Regional Hospital is one of eight Trauma Level 4 hospitals in the state, thus essential to South Dakota's rural health care system.	\$1,000,000
Douglas County Memorial Hospital, Inc.	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a CT scanner and an Omnicell Medication Unit. The funds will be used to replace their current CT scanner, which is a vital piece of equipment when diagnosing and treating patients. The Omnicell Medication Unit will significantly reduce the amount of time nursing staff need for vaccine and medication management, allowing them to focus on the patient's medical needs.	\$172,000
Walworth County Care Center, Inc.	This Rural Development investment will be used to expand Walworth County Care's heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) unit. This project will also add a Global Plasma Solution Equipment filtration system to the Walworth County Care. This will improve their air quality and effectively mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and other infectious diseases that are spread through air borne particles.	\$44,000
Fall River Health Services	This Rural Development investment will be used to replace and update equipment and improve technology to triage patients more efficiently and effectively. Fall River Health Service will use the funding to improve their ability to diagnose, treat, handle patient surges, and mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and other infectious diseases.	\$341,000
Horizon Health Care Inc	This Rural Development investment will be used to update Horizon Health Care Inc.'s backup and cyber security equipment. This equipment will enhance the telehealth services as well as software licensing updates. They also will update their IT departments computers, as they work with all 23 counties and play a role in supporting the clinics with the telehealth services and the telehealth system. This project will benefit a large area of South Dakota, including underserved areas on Native American reservations.	\$36,000
Burke Community Memorial Hospital, Inc	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a computerized tomography (CT) scanner and furniture that can be cleaned to meet the COVID-19 cleaning standards. The current CT scanner is so old, parts have become obsolete. This is a vital piece of equipment when determining treatment of patients. The furniture purchased will replace current furniture with porous surfaces that cannot easily be sterilized throughout the clinic and hospital.	\$275,000

Hot Springs Ambulance Service, Inc.	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a 4-wheel drive ambulance and vision scopes for all their ambulances. The new ambulance will help Hot Springs Ambulance Service reach patients during inclement weather and areas with minimal serviced roads. The vision scopes allow the staff to intubate patients in respiratory distress. The COVID pandemic strained many small communities' health care providers and equipment. Many common items had a surge in usage, therefore created a need to upgrade or replace equipment sooner than anticipated. Ambulances were not exempt from this issue. As a front-line provider, it is imperative they be able to reach and stabilize patients in their service area.	\$132,000
City of Freeman	This Rural Development investment will be used to upgrade ambulances. A power load system will be added to both ambulances, enabling staff to move patients quickly and safely. The older ambulance's chassis will be replaced, allowing the city of Freeman to improve their ability to reach and transport patients during inclement weather. The COVID pandemic strained many small communities' health care providers and equipment. Many common items had surge a in usage, therefore creating a need to upgrade or replace equipment sooner than anticipated. Ambulances were not exempt from this issue. As a front-line provider, it is imperative they be able to reach and stabilize patients in their service area.	\$26,000
Douglas County-Ambulance Vehicle	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase an ambulance, with a power system to run equipment in the ambulance. The new ambulance will help Douglas County provide better assistance to patients in respiratory distress without draining their power supply. The COVID pandemic strained many small communities' health care providers and equipment. Many common items had a surge in usage, therefore creating a need to upgrade or replace equipment sooner than anticipated. Ambulances were not exempt from this issue. As a front-line provider, it is imperative they be able to reach and stabilize patients in their service area.e they be able to reach and stabilize patients in their service area.	\$98,000
Huron Regional Medical Center, Inc.	This Rural Development investment will be used to cover the cost that Huron Regional Medical Center incurred during the COVID-19 pandemic. Funds will also be used to purchase new equipment to help with current and future health care needs of Beadle County. The funds will reimburse them for many expenses incurred during the height of the pandemic from intubation pods to noninvasive ventilators. Beadle County was one of South Dakota's first hot spots. Huron Regional Medical Center's decisive actions helped get the pandemic under control in a county with diverse communities and meat processing facilities. This grant will also allow Huron Regional Medical Center to upgrade neonate ventilators and equipment to store vaccines and prepare the hospital for any surges from future pandemics.	\$243,000
Wagner Community Memorial Hospital	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a computerized topography (CT) scanner, vaccine refrigerator and freezer, and heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) system. This equipment will allow Wagner Community Memorial Hospital to offer quality services in rural areas. During the COVID-19 pandemic the CT scanner usage increased significantly, which decreased its useful life. The hospital also is updating their vaccine storage equipment, which is important for their service area and other service areas, as the Wagner Community Memorial Hospital is a distribution point for other clinics in Charles Mix County. The new HVAC system will provide heating and cooling to all areas of the hospital, further mitigating the spread of viruses and bacteria.	\$661,000
Walworth County Care Center, Inc.	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system for the nursing home. The HVAC system improves their ability to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 along with other viruses and bacteria throughout the facility, protecting patients, staff, and visitors.	\$46,000

Day County	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase ambulances and equipment from the current privately owned ambulance service, whose owners are retiring. Day County does not have another ambulance service, nor were any of the surrounding counties able to provide the needed services, which would leave Day County residents with a huge gap in their emergency service care. The applicant will use the funds to purchase the equipment portion of the current ambulance service. The grant will also allow Day County to upgrade two ambulances and purchase an automated chest compression system. Ambulance services are a necessity during normal times, but the pandemic created even more urgency. As a front-line provider, it is imperative they be able to reach and stabilize patients in their service area.	\$90,000
Winner Regional	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase storage equipment, sterilizing machine and a heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system for the hospital pharmacy. Winner Regional Healthcare Center will use the funds to upgrade to a more efficient and effective sterilization storage system. The HVAC system will allow the hospital to mitigate the spread of viruses and bacteria to the hospital pharmacy. Finally, a surgical equipment sterilizing machine will allow Winner Regional Healthcare to treat more patients and enable them to deal with surges during the pandemic and any future medical needs.	\$138,000
Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase a mobile clinic. The clinic staff will travel to all seven districts on the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate reservation to provide basic health care needs. The mobile clinic will have two exam rooms, an area to collect basic medical testing for the staff to return to the clinic for processing. The mobile clinic will have storage for vaccines and medications. The Mobile Clinic will allow medical staff from the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate Tribe to go to remote areas of the reservation, where many members have limited resources.	\$71,000
Bennett Co Hospital & Nursing Home	This Rural Development investment will be used to purchase health care equipment to help address the varying needs of rural residents in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. Equipment purchases include two new ambulances, two home health care vehicles, a portable X-ray machine, ultrasound machine, three temperature screening kiosks and an ultraviolet sterilizer. The updates will allow Bennett County Hospital to be better equipped to handle future pandemics and treat more patients locally. Home Health vehicles will allow hospital staff to extend services to residents who are unable to travel in Bennett, Oglala Lakota, Jackson, and Todd counties.	\$897,000
Lewis and Clark Behavioral Health Services	This Rural Development investment will be used to construct a facility for Lewis and Clark Behavioral Health Services Inc. Established in 1977 to provide behavioral health and substance abuse services, they have been operating out of several buildings located at different sites throughout Yankton, South Dakota. The new project will help to improve safety, care and accessibility for patients and staff by housing all services under one roof. The new facility will be located in Yankton and provide services to Yankton, Bon Homme, Charles Mix, Clay, Gregory, Hutchinson, Union, Yankton, Douglas, Davison, Aurora, Brule, Jerauld, Miner, Sanborn, Hanson, Buffalo, Lyman, and Tripp counties.
