ReConnect Program – Tribal Fact Sheet



Funding to facilitate broadband deployment in unserved tribal communities



What does this program do?

The ReConnect Program provides loans, grants, and loan-grant combinations to bring high-speed internet to rural areas that lack sufficient access to broadband. ReConnect Program funds can be used to fund the costs of construction, improvement, or acquisition of facilities and equipment needed to provide broadband service.

The ReConnect Program fosters private-sector investments in broadband infrastructure to deploy high-speed internet service to rural homes, businesses, and essential community facilities that support public safety, health care, schools, libraries, business and industry, and agricultural operations, among other sites.

Who may apply for this program?

Applicants eligible to apply for ReConnect Program funds include:

- Cooperatives or mutual associations
- For-profit corporations, limited liability companies, or limited liability partnerships
- States, local governments, or any agency, subdivision, instrumentality, or political subdivision thereof
- A territory or possession of the U.S.
- · Federally recognized tribes (as

listed pursuant to the Federally Recognized Indian Tribe List Act of 1994, 25 U.S.C. 479a)

Eligible applicants must be able to supply broadband service to all customers in their proposed funded service area (PFSA) at the same time.

What is an eligible area?

For a geographic area to be eligible to receive federal funds from this program it must meet two criteria: (1) the area must be rural and (2) 50 percent of households in the area must lack sufficient access to broadband service.

- WHAT IS CONSIDERED "RURAL"?
 - Service areas cannot be located in a city, town, or incorporated area with a population greater than 20,000, or an urbanized area adjacent to a city or town with a population greater than 50,000 people.
 - Eligible areas must be completely contained within a rural area or composed of multiple rural areas.

- WHAT IS "SUFFICIENT ACCESS"?
 - Currently, sufficient access b broadband is defined as 100 megabits per second (Mbps) downstream and 20 Mbps upstream.

How may funds be used?

This program provides funding for:

- The construction or improvement of facilities capable of delivering 100 Mbps symmetrical service to every premises in the PFSA at the same time.
- The acquisition of an existing system not currently providing sufficient access to broadband service, under certain circumstances, and with restrictions.
- Up to 5 percent of the requested amount can be used for preapplication expenses and up to 3 percent of this amount can be used to cover the costs of the environmental review.

How do we apply?

Applications must be submitted through the Agency's online application system located on the ReConnect webpage, https://www.usda.gov/reconnect. All materials required for completing an application are included in the online system. The ReConnect webpage also includes basic program information and detailed application guidance.

When are applications due?

The current application deadline is November 2, 2022.

Is SUTA applicable to the ReConnect Program?

Yes, tribal applicants may request the following Substantially Underserved Trust Area (SUTA) considerations under the ReConnect Program:

- Interest rates as low as 2 percent
- Extended repayment terms

Can we request a waiver of the matching requirement?

The Rural Utilities Service (RUS) recognizes the importance of adjusting collateral requirements to ensure ReConnect Program funds reach unserved communities with the greatest need.

The ReConnect Program may offer 100 percent grants *without* a matching requirement. This offer is announced via the FOA. The FOA published on August 4, 2022 does offer 100 percent grants without a matching requirement..

What are key steps when preparing to apply?

Prior to the release of the ReConnect Program FOA, RUS recommends that applicants:

- Register with SAM.gov or ensure your registration is current
- Prepare your resolution for the Authorized Representative Request (ARR) Process
- Begin compiling required documents outlined in the program regulation (7 CFR 1740)
- Establish partnerships for successful project completion

- Meet with your GFR
- Ensure all users working on the application have a level 2 eAuthentication (eAuth) ID

Can an entity receive funding to serve Tribal Lands without the consent of the Tribe?

No, a Tribal Government Resolution of Consent must be provided if a nontribal applicant is proposing service over or on tribal lands. Any applicant that fails to provide the Tribal Government Resolution of Consent will not be considered for funding.

Can Tribes self-certify whether broadband service exists on their lands?

Yes, Tribal Governments are the official authority on whether tribal lands are served, unserved, or underserved by providers. RUS will work with Tribal Governments to determine whether tribal land is adequately served.

Can ReConnect funds be used for monitoring expenses associated with the National Historic Preservation Act (Section 106) review?

Yes, monitoring expenses are considered professional costs and are eligible to be funded using up to 3 percent of the total award amount.
